Approximately 15% of the students receive scholarships from State Govt., Central Govt. and other national agencies

5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for

a. Students from SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections

- Reservation in admissions are provided as per the Karnataka Education Act
- Tuition fee is reduced as per the Karnataka Govt. directives
- Scholarship is provided
- Books are lent from the SC/ST book bank which can be retained by the students till the completion of the examinations of the semester or the year or the course.
- Remedial coaching is provided
- Mid – day meal scheme is provided by the staff of the college and the nearby Sanman Hotel.
- Fees of deserving students are borne by the faculty of the college in case of economically weaker sections.
- SC/ST cell and Equal opportunity centres are created in the college during the 12th Plan period which is yet to commence its operations.

b. Students with physical disabilities

- Admissions to physically challenged students are provided without looking into merit. Such of those candidates desirous of joining the institute are required to meet the Principal or admission committee convener, submit an application stating the nature of infirmity and then enroll in the institution.
- Physically challenged students are provided class rooms in the ground floor itself. Their functional mobility is helped by the peers, faculty and non-teaching staff. Special care and concern is



showered by the faculty and the peers to provide an environment of joyous learning. The librarians and the staff help differently-abled students in meeting their requirements of books and study material from the library.

- During examinations, scribes are provided for students with physical disability and extra time of one hour is provided as per the provisions of the university.

c. **Overseas students**

No overseas students are admitted in the college over many years.

d. **Students to participate in various competitions / National and International**

The College encourages students to participate in various competitions (Sports, cultural and literary events, science events, etc.) at all levels by providing them the travel allowance, registration fee, concessions in terms of attendance guidance for preparing for the competition, coaching in the case of sports, etc.

e. **Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.**

The college has entered into MOU with the Rangadore Memorial Hospital one of whose objectives is to create awareness on health issues of students in general. In particular, certain issues pertaining to health of girl students like Polycystic Ovaries, cervical cancer, etc. are being highlighted through various programs. The college has pledged to join its hands in the global effort of curbing HIV/AIDS menace. In this direction several programs like invited lectures on awareness about HIV/AIDS, wall poster making competition among students, harnessing the concept of single sex partner, observing the World AIDS Prevention Day, etc. are conducted in the campus. Eye pledge camp has been conducted by NSS. The college has first aid center in the NCC room and first aid kits are also available in Zoology department, Sports Department and Office.



- f. Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams
- A formal coaching class for CPT – Common Proficiency Test for becoming eligible to do a CA course is offered to students of I Semester B.Com. The coaching is provided to cover the topics on Fundamentals of Accounts, Mercantile Law, General Economics & Quantitative Aptitude .
 - A formal coaching to various competitive examinations like CAT, SLET, NET, GATE, Civil Services, etc. is not offered by the college directly. However, the college encourages a private institute, IMS located in Jayanagar, to train not only the students of the college but also students from other institutions to appear for CAT and other MBA entrance tests by letting the college premises on Saturday afternoons and Sundays. The success rate of students from this coaching center attached to Vijaya College is appreciably high.
 - The college organizes coaching classes through the placement cell on Numerical and Quantitative aptitude for students of final year for free.
 - A plan is chalked out to introduce coaching for entry into civil services for SC/ST/OBC under the fund support from UGC in the 12th plan period.
 - A plan is underway to introduce coaching for IIT – JAM (Joint Admission test for M.Sc.) in the departments of physics and mathematics.
- g. Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.,)
- The English department has introduced an add – on certificate level course in Communication English which emphasizes on reading, writing, speaking and listening skills through its language laboratory.
 - The computer science department has introduced add – on courses in ‘Network Simulation’ and ‘Software testing’ course at



certificate and diploma levels.

- A 'Floor Associate Course' was conducted by the department of computer science where students of B.Sc., BCA and B.Com. participated. The course was run by Centum Learning, a venture capital of Bharti Walmart group.
- The department of computer science also provided a skill development course on 'VB Dot net training'.
- The department of electronics offers add – on course on 'Electronic Product Design and Its Applications' to students pursuing electronics.
- Personality development and Soft skills programs are conducted by the Placement cell for the benefit of final year students.

h. Support for "slow learners"

- Remedial coaching classes are held for *Slow learners and academically weak* students. These students are often provided with bilingual explanations and discussions.
- These students are counseled and offered guidance to refer the examination question papers of previous years and identify the frequently repeated questions. They are made to answer these oft repeated questions in each topic.
- Question bank is prepared by most of the departments.

i. Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning/ corporate / business house etc.

- Eminent resource persons from nationally reputed research institutions and industries are invited to deliver lectures in the college by different departments. Interaction with these resource persons motivates an interest in the students to pursue higher education in reputed institutions.
- The departments of the college organize workshops, seminars and conferences where resource persons from different institutes of higher learning are invited to deliver lectures. Interactions help



the students to gain a perspective of the different higher learning institutes

- The visits organized by different departments to research institutes, industries, etc. help the students to get an exposure of these higher learning institutes.
- Interactive sessions with Chartered Accountants, Income Tax and Other professionals are organized to ignite the students' desire for new ventures.

j. Publication of student magazines

- The college annually publishes the magazine which provides a platform to harness the creative potential and hone the writing skills of students
- Wall magazines / Newsletter are brought out by different departments and committees of the college at various points of time. This also enables the students to showcase their creativity in the subject content and expression.

5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills among the students and the impact of the efforts.

The institution encourages the students to inculcate entrepreneurial skills by inviting eminent people of the industry to present case studies of different small scale organizations. The case study analysis gives a picture of the entrepreneurial skills needed. 'Entrepreneurial Development Program' is introduced as one of the subjects in the VI Semester of B.Com. Students are taken to small scale industry visits where they get to know how the small scale industries function and what difficulties they face. The college believes that such visits and lectures develop necessary entrepreneurial skills among students.

Various committees are formed at the beginning of each academic year in order to promote the extra-curricular activities and sports in the college. During the first month of the Odd Semester course, Talents Day Celebrations ‘**VIKASANA**’ are held to identify the best talent in cultural and literary field. The Commerce activities are held under Commerce Committee and every year an Inter-Collegiate fest is conducted under the title ‘**VINYAAS**’ which has been very popular among the colleges of Bangalore University. Various inter-class as well as inter-collegiate activities in Science and Sports are also held. The students not only conduct the activities but also participate in them. Sponsorship for inter-collegiate events is generally raised by the students.

The following policies are adopted in the college.

- Admission for sportspersons in the sports quota
- Relaxation in the attendance
- Organizing special remedial classes
- Providing participants with financial support
- Providing professional coaching in sports, cultural and literary events
- The college arranges for the Food requirements for all students during the coaching, practice and the competition
- Organizing Inter-Collegiate sports meets such as basketball, volley ball, throw ball, etc.
- All the uniform expenses for team events are met by the College
- Equipment for various games are also provided by the College.
- The College also encourages various committees to organize Inter-College debates, quizzes and cultural events.



- The College also encourages students to join the NCC and NSS units of the College and participate in the different events.

5.1.7 Enumerating on the support and guidance provided to the students in preparing for the competitive exams, give details on the number of students appeared and qualified in various competitive exams such as UGC-CSIR- NET, UGC-NET, SLET, ATE / CAT / GRE / TOFEL / GMAT / Central /State services, Defense, Civil Services, etc.

- Books are procured to the library for use by the students to face various competitive examinations.
- The faculty guides the students regarding the reference material to be used and the e – resources to be browsed for preparing for these examinations.
- Though a large number of students pass some of the national level competitive examinations, the following is the small list available since mechanism for collecting such data is not in existence at present.

 - **Vivek Ram** of 2010 – 2013 Batch B. Sc student of Physics, Mathematics and Computer Science has been appointed as Lieutenant, 52, Bengal regiment, West Bengal sappers during October 2014 having undergone training and cleared the **Combined Defence Services examination** in 2013.
 - **Tanushree.N.** – (2009-2012 BSc BcGmb) : Cleared **NET** in Life Sciences in the year 2014.
 - **Sushma Singh** (2006-09) batch student got selected in **CAT** during 2010 with **4th Rank** and got admitted into **IIM, Ahmedabad**



5.1.8 What type of counselling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.) ?

Academic counselling:

- The Admission Committee conducts academic counselling at the time of entry into the College regarding the choice of stream and subjects.
- Academic counselling is given to the students through various seminars and workshops organized for them.
- Academic counseling is given by the respective class teachers
- Subject specific counseling is provided by the departmental heads and the individual teachers.
- Students having shortage of attendance and difficulties in their academic performance are also counselled.
- Students having issues in errors in evaluation of answer scripts at the university level examinations are suggested to collect the Xerox copy of the answer scripts and proper suggestions and counseling provided by individual teachers, heads and principal.

Personal counselling:

- Personal counselling is provided by the class teachers and the respective practical class batch teachers.
- Counseling is offered to students on family issues, relationship difficulties, communication problems, peer pressure, self-esteem, self development, personality development, grief and bereavement as and when required by class teachers, different committee conveners and faculty members during their personal interaction. These are also provided by the heads of different departments.

Career counselling:

- Career counselling is handled by the Career Counselling and Placement Cell through seminars, workshop and interaction with various resource persons and professionals from different fields.



- Career/course counselling begins right at the time of admission through the Admission Committee. The teachers guide and direct the students regarding the choice of stream / subjects.
- Seminars and workshops are other ways of disseminating information among the students and counselling them regarding career options

Psycho-social counselling:

- Psycho – social counselling on issues such as adjustment difficulties, at risk behavior – suicidal, addiction, aggressive behaviour, depression, anxiety, stress and trauma etc. are held whenever the need arises by the senior faculty of the college.
- **Dr. Mahesh Arvaid**, Department of chemistry is a specially trained counselor(trained by NIMHANS). Dr. Mahesh Aravind also provides Psycho – Social counseling to students and in case of special requirements teachers refer students to him.
- The Women Empowerment Cell ‘DHWANI’ invites resource persons from various fields for professional as well as psychological counselling for the women students
- Cases difficult to handle are suggested for professional counseling by clinical Psychiatrists.

5.1.9 Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students? The college has a structured mechanism for Career counseling and placement services.

- The Placement Cell organizes Career Awareness Programmes and placement opportunities to students of all the streams of the College.



- The placement cell organizes workshop on CV (Curriculum Vitae) or resume writing.
- The placement cell conducts mock interviews and group discussions to enable the students to face the corporate recruiting companies.
- The Placement Officer contacts companies with requirements for manpower in various positions. Since students are mostly interested in opportunities in the IT, ITES, finance and related fields, such companies are given preference.
- Interested companies also contact the College authorities and the placement officer for recruiting candidates for different positions

The main objective of the grievance redressal cell in the college is to instill a sense of confidence amongst the students. Three senior teachers are functioning in this cell. 5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

The College resolves the issues pertaining to sexual harassment through the following committees:

1. Anti – sexual harassment cell
2. The Grievance Cell
3. The Women’s Empowerment Committee
4. The College Management.

The policy on the sexual harassment is declared as under :

Declaration of Policy. –

Vijaya College, under the Management of BHS Higher Education Society, shall value the dignity of every individual, enhance the development of its human resources, guarantee full respect for human rights, ensures the full enforcement of “Fundamental Rights” under articles 14, 15, 19(1) (g) and 21 of the Constitution of India , and uphold the dignity of workers, employees, applicants for employment, students or those undergoing training, instruction or education. Towards this end, all forms of sexual harassment in the employment, education or training environment are hereby declared unlawful.

Composition of the Anti – Sexual Harassment Committee

1. The Committee shall be headed by a senior woman faculty of the college and shall be designated as the “**Chairperson**”
2. The committee shall have two senior women teaching faculty members, at least one senior male teaching faculty member, at least one woman administrative staff and one woman class – IV staff. The committee shall have three nominated girl student representatives.
3. The committee shall have Principal and one nominated person from the management, the BHS Higher Education Society as its members.
4. The committee shall include, subject to acceptance, the Inspector of Police of the jurisdictional police station, namely the Siddapura Police Station.
5. The committee shall include a parent of a girl student of the college.



The policy is uploaded on the website and publicized to all students. The students can lodge complaint through any of the following means :

1. Through the student grievance redressal cell
2. Through the class teachers or any individual teacher
3. Through the phone to the chairperson or any member of Anti – sexual harassment cell
4. Through anonymous letters or letters with identification to any of the member of the Anti – sexual harassment cell
5. Through any member of the Women Empowerment Committee
6. Through the Vice – Principal or Principal
7. Through the feedback forms

The provisions for resolving the sexual harassment references or complaints are as given below.

PROCEDURE TO BE FOLLOWED BY THE COMMITTEE

1. The Committee shall meet as and when any complaint is received by it. Complaint may be received by any member of the committee.
2. The Committee may direct the complainant to prepare and submit a detailed statement of incidents if the written complaint lacks exactness and required particulars, within a period of two (2) days from such direction or such other time period that the Committee may decide.
3. The Committee shall direct the accused employee(s) to prepare and submit a written response to the complaint / allegations within a period of four (4) days from such direction or such other time period as the Committee may decide.
4. Each party shall be provided with a copy of the written statement(s) submitted by the other.
5. The Committee shall conduct the proceedings in accordance with the principles of natural justice. It shall allow both parties reasonable opportunity of presenting their case. However, should the accused choose not to participate in the proceedings, the Committee shall continue *ex parte*.
6. The Committee shall allow both parties to produce relevant documents and witnesses to support their case. Documents produced by either party shall be affixed with that party's signature to certify the document as original / true copy.



7. The party against whom the document / witness is produced shall be entitled to challenge / cross-examine the same.
8. The Committee shall sit on a day-to-day basis to record and consider the evidence produced by both parties.
9. As far as practicable, all proceedings of the Committee shall take place in the presence of both parties.
10. Minutes of all proceedings of the Committee shall be prepared and duly signed by the members of the Committee.
11. The Committee shall make all endeavour to complete its proceedings within a period of fifteen (15) days from the date of receipt of complaint.
12. The Committee shall record its findings in writing supported with reasons and shall forward the same with its recommendations, to the Principal/Management, within a period of five (5) days from completion of the proceedings before it. In case the Committee finds that the facts disclose the commission of a criminal offence by the accused person, this shall be specifically mentioned in the Committee's report.
13. If, in the course of the proceedings before it, the Committee is satisfied that *a prima facie* case of sexual harassment is made out against the accused employee(s)/student and that there is any chance of the recurrence of any such action, or that it is required to do so in the interests of justice, it may, on the request of the complainant or otherwise, disciplinary action could be initiated in the form of:-
 - (i) Warning
 - (ii) Written apology
 - (iii) Bond of good behaviour
 - (iv) Adverse remarks in the confidential report
 - (v) Debarring from supervisory duties
 - (vi) Denial of membership of statutory bodies
 - (vii) Denial of re-employment/re - admission
 - (viii) Stopping of increments / promotion/denying admission ticket
 - (ix) Reverting, demotion
 - (x) Suspension
 - (xi) Dismissal
 - (xii) Any other relevant mechanism
14. If, in the course of the proceedings before it, the Committee is satisfied that any person has retaliated against / victimized the complainant or any person assisting the complainant as a result of the complaint having been made or such assistance having been offered, the Committee shall report the same in writing, to the



Principal/Management, with reasons and with recommendations of the action to be taken against such person.

If, at the culmination of the proceedings before it, the Committee is satisfied that the complainant has knowingly brought false charges of sexual harassment against any person, it shall report the same in writing to the Principal/Management, with reasons and with recommendations of the action to be taken against such person.

- Mid – day meals are provided to economically weaker sections both by the staff and a nearby hotel 'Sanman Hotel'
- The fees for economically weak and deserving students is borne by the staff of the college
- The canteen provides food, refreshments and beverages at subsidized prices.

IV. Health

- First – aid kits are available at various units in the college like the Zoology department, Sports Department, NCC and the Office
- Health tie – up with Ranga Dore Memorial hospital provides health check up and treatment at a concessional price to staff and students of Vijaya College
- Annual health check up for staff and students of Vijaya College at discounted prices offered by the 'Clumax Diagnostic Center' run by an alumnus of the college Dr. Praveen.

5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment?

- Regular and systematic conduct of classes leading to the academic satisfaction and achievement in terms of university examination results. This motivates students to take up higher education to achieve at higher levels of learning
- The brochures received from institutions of higher learning as well as examination dates of common competitive examinations such as CAT, KMAT, JAM, GATE, etc. are displayed on the notice boards. These practices keep the students well informed on the choices and options that are open to them.
- The department of physics has been conducting NGPE (National Graduate Physics Examination) examination of IAPT (Indian Association of Physics Teachers) to motivate the students to take up higher studies in physics. This practice has been in vogue for more than one and half decades. Orientation classes and solving previous examination papers are taken up to encourage the students to face the NGPE examination.



- The department of Physics has planned to conduct IIT – JAM coaching for the present first year students so that they should be able to perform better in the JAM examination and seek admission to M.Sc. Physics in one of the IITs.
- The college has four PG programmes – M.Sc. in Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics and M.Com. to enable vertical mobility of students to pursue higher studies.
- Career guidance sessions are organized to enlighten the students about the opportunities and employment market available after the higher studies.
- The college conducts programs like Communication skills, Personality development, Soft skills, arithmetic and quantitative aptitude orientation sessions, etc. to help students face the competitive examinations and also prepare them for taking up employment
- The placement cell conducts orientation programs to make the students familiar with the job market and its demands.
- The placement cell conducts campus recruitment process to help students secure jobs on the campus.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

- Identification of academically weak students and economically weak students who are at the risk of failure or drop out in the initial months of their study in the college
- Conduct of remedial coaching classes

5.3.5 Does the college have a Student Council or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.

A formal student council or students' union does not exist in the college. However, the democratic freedom of students is in no way hampered by this and it is ensured by nominating student representatives to various committees from different classes.

Students who excel in curricular, extra curricular and co-curricular activities are chosen as student representatives. The students form



the hub of all decisions in various committees. They are encouraged to conduct all cultural and sports competitions which in turn develop their leadership qualities, interpersonal skills and organizing abilities. The faculty members also guide them suitably when required.

The PG students of each stream of the college have developed a culture of hosting Welcome and Fare – well functions as part of the annual activities. At the start of the academic year, the respective stream III Semester PG students host a Fresher’s Day programme and orient the new students to the college atmosphere and the expectations thereon. Similarly, the II Semester PG students host the Fare – Well programme to the graduating PG students of their stream. The financial burden is shouldered by the students themselves.
