

#### 1. Admission 2022-23

The extent of preparations for admission to college for the academic year 2022-23 was given by IQAC coordinator. The process has begun with the advertisement committee being formed. It has started preparing the contents for the banner. The committee has planned different modes of advertisement that can be taken up. The online registration will begin shortly. Dean said, the management will fully support the admission process so that large number of students get admitted to our college in different streams. Dr. Devaraju suggested that the advertisement should contain possible and relevant online courses that the students take up with the internet support from the college. Students can take the online courses from the college itself. Principal mentioned that the admission policy is already given by BHSHES. Members also sid the admission process must be completely automated.

#### 2. Matters related to college website

All the members were asked to go through the revamped college website and suggest any changes. All the relevant documents and data required for NAAC are being uploaded in the website.



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Curriculum of all courses are designed by Bengaluru Central University whereas the curriculum of the certificate and add – on courses are developed by the college. The faculty members ensure that the syllabi are covered as per the academic calendar by taking extra classes during weekends to compensate for general holidays. Remedial coaching classes are arranged, particularly in science streams to strengthen the slow learners. Periodical internal tests are conducted to test the level of acquired knowledge of the slow learners. Handouts are distributed among the students for understanding the contents of specific topics—from time to time. Question banks are prepared by different departments and passed on to students in order to make the students confident for appearing in the semester examinations. Periodical review meetings are held in the respective departments regarding the syllabus completion. The college management has made it mandatory for the all the faculty members to complete the syllabus covered before the commencement of the semester examination. The college has laboratories and classrooms with partial LCD projector facilities.

Calendar of events is prepared at the beginning of the academic session. The affiliating university provides the working days schedule as well as for co – curricular activities specified in the academic calendar. The calendar also announces the dates of internal assessment and semester examination and students are given opportunities to verify their internal marks through the university. Teachers of the Institution participate in curriculum development and answer sheets assessment of the affiliating university and/are the members of the affiliating university Board of Study Committees as well as are in the panel of semester examination question paper setting committees.

Gender issues are highlighted through various invited lectures organized by the Women Empowerment Cell of the college. Environmental Education is mandatory and to promote environment awareness among the students, 'Environment Science and Public Health' are the compulsory papers introduced by the affiliating University at the UG level. Every year the college invites resource persons during the World Environment Day to sensitize the students on the emerging issues related to environment conservation. Tree plantation programme is conducted every year in the college. The university has also introduced a compulsory paper on 'Indian Constitution and Human Rights' besides making the Value Education as a compulsory paper at the undergraduate level by the affiliating university.

#### Qualitative analysis of Criterion 2

The learning levels of students are assessed through the internal tests, subject assignments, and presentation during the regular classroom sessions. Bridge Courses are organized to the freshers in the UG departments of Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Botany, Zoology, Biotechnology, and Microbiology whenever such necessities are noticed. Periodic Counselling and career guidance programmes are conducted from time to time. Commerce students are continuously advised to keep track of stock market proceedings; developments in finance and economic sectors of the country; assets, liabilities and profit declarations of companies; income tax and business law changes, etc. from newspapers, business magazines and internet. Science students are suggested to collect interesting science news items from newspapers and from other periodicals and research journals. Both the science and commerce students are encouraged to deliver lectures on the topics that they have collected and are encourage to make display on notice boards from time to time. Students of English discipline are encouraged to give presentations on the techniques of effective Business Communication Skills besides making the college students aware about the appropriate use of words and sentences while answering questions normally raised at the time of interviews



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which in turn boost their self-confidence, and expression power. Advanced learners are suggested to enrol for career oriented add – on courses offered by some of the departments. Merit certificates, prizes, cash awards and appreciation certificates are issued to the students of the college at the annual college day celebration who figured in the merit list of the university examination. Numerical ability skills, vocabulary skills, etc. are provided by the Career Counselling Cell of the college periodically. University curriculum is designed with the student-centric approach by making the project work compulsory for the students of some programmes. Faculty members practices student centric methods. However, it needs further improvement. Few faculty members are using ICT tools for teaching learning. Commerce stream students are deeply involved in an annual Vinyaas Inter-collegiate competitions and it includes a number of business competitions including Share Market transactions, Income tax transactions, Branding a logo, and Business development model, etc. In language classes, students are exposed to role plays, group discussions and case studies. NPTEL resources are uploaded in the library for easy access both for students and faculty members.

Internal assessment of student is based on three criteria which are communicated to the students on college website. Internal assessment is based on tests, assignment/project work/seminar and class attendance. Student attendance is reviewed every month and the class teachers counsel the students with attendance shortage and motivate them to attend further classes. The internal assessment marks are displayed on the website for three components separately and thus, the consolidated score is made. Student Examination Grievances in internal assessment to be more transparent and should be addresses timely. Outcome based education is partially understood by the faculty members and there is no CO-PO mapping and direct and indirect assessment tools to be used for attainment of Learning outcomes.

The departments of computer science and electronics have promoted skill-based projects by providing knowledge and latest technologies and infrastructure required as a part of curricular program. This has helped students to become independent consultants and they were able to set up their own start-ups. The department of Life Sciences has designed Vermicomposting, Mushroom culture, Bio – Sanitisers production programs. Biotechnology department has a collaboration with Sreedhar Bhat's Laboratory wherein the students get hands – on experience in familiarizing with the new equipment, special practical sessions, project work, and internships. This has enabled good skill development and has enhanced the employability opportunities. College organizes intercollegiate events such as Vijnaan and Vinyaas regularly on various skill-based activities to enhance students' scientific temperament and to develop their innovative and entrepreneurial skills.

NCC (National Cadet Corps), NSS (National Service Scheme), Youth Red Cross(YRC), Rangers & Rovers(RR), Women Empowerment Committee (WEC) of the college conduct multifarious activities. A few of the outreach programs including Blood Donation, HIV/AIDs awareness programs, Poster competition in AIDS awareness, Eye testing, Eye Pledge, Medical Check-up, Health Hygiene awareness, Polio Immunization, Organ Donation Awareness are conducted besides organizing national festivals like Independence Day and Republic Day jointly by all the wings including sports department. It is functioning in three storeyed building accommodating 44 class rooms with average area of 80.22 sq.mts., 19 staff rooms, 28 laboratories with adequate equipment, one zoology museum with 242 specimens, 10 rest room for girls only, 500 seating capacity indoor auditorium, 1000 capacity outdoor auditorium, canteen, Canara bank and ATM etc. Adequate water supply and power supply ensured by two generators and UPS. Seventeen class rooms (out of total 44) are fitted with LCD projectors. Cross ventilated class rooms have requisite fixtures and furniture. 13 Laptops provided for faculty use. Good collection of knowledge resource available in the library. Library has a stocking of 71806 books with 4600 books has been added in the past four years. Computers are LAN connected. Computer Student ratio in the college is 1: 10.

College has two auditorium-one in indoor auditorium with 500 seating capacity and other outdoor stadium with 1000 seating capacity. Both the auditorium is used for cultural activities. Facilities are available for indoor and outdoor games like- Volley ball, Basketball, Badminton. The library is partially automated with ILMS software –Easy-Lib (version 4.2.2). Library has subscribed e-journals and e-books through INFLIBNET and DELNET.

The IT infrastructure of the college comprises of 284 computers. Printers (44), Xerox machines (6) etc. are available for the students and offices. **All systems are connected to the Internet with 2 Mbps bandwidth.** 

To take care of maintenance and utilization of different facilities, college has constituted several committees like Infrastructure committee, Purchase committee, Sports committee, Library advisory committee, Sports committee, Time table committee, IT infrastructure committee and Greening Committee, etc.

The maintenance of UPS and batteries is done by AMC agencies. Cleanliness and maintenance of premises outsourced. Plumbing work is also monitored by the engineer. Log book is maintained for proper utilisation of equipment

Institute facilitates various Government scholarships and provides non-Government scholarships to the students as per institute rules. Institution facilitates students' representation and engage them in various administrative, co-curricular and extracurricular activities through duly established processes and norms. Student representation has been ensured in statutory committees such as Students Grievance Redressal cell, Anti Sexual Harassment cell, Women empowerment Committee, Career Counselling and Placement Cell, Library Advisory committee and other functional committees including NCC, NSS, Rovers and Rangers, and Youth red cross unit etc., sports committee, cultural and literary committee, etc.. These representatives bring the views and grievances of students to the authorities.

The college has registered two alumni i) "Vijaya Vaanijya Alumni (VVA) by commerce faculty and ii) "Jeeva Vijaya Alumni" by life Sciences department.

Vijaya Vaanijya Alumni has donated RO water plant and provide scholarship to few economically weaker students. Vijaya Vaanijya Alumni has organized annual meet named "Mahamilan". Vijaya Vaanijya Alumni has organized communication skill, Soft skill /Life skill, Accounting and Taxation and Computer application training programs for B. Com and BBA students. Vijaya Vaanijya Alumni and Vijaya Physical Science Alumni sponsor mid-day meal to deserving students. Jeeva Vijaya Alumni has celebrated World Environment Day and conducted tree plantation along with the life science students.

#### Qualitative analysis of Criterion 6

The Vijaya College is owned by BHS Higher education society, which is quite an old and experienced body/society in the field of education. All management People are deeply involved in the management and governance of the institution. The Vision and Mission of the college are well defined. The Principal is the head of the institution and is responsible for its functioning. She follows decentralized and participative management practices by taking support from the faculty members in organizing the regular as well as special programs and activities of the college. The college has well-defined strategic plan and it could be found from the interaction with the governing body that it is very clear about the way forward for college. Various Cells and Committees have been constituted for the effective functioning of the college. There is a grievance redressal mechanism in place. The performance appraisal system is collected only from faculty members who are due for promotion to higher cadre. The college conducts internal and external financial audits regularly and there are no audit objections. The College is primarily dependent upon financial aid from the government and salaries of all teaching and staff (except of management post) are taken care of by state Government. All these grants from the state Government are subject to the regulation and audit to be conducted by state.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell is established in the year 2005. The IQAC has formulated plans or strategies for Quality enhancement for the institution by compiling with the different points raised by the academic committees of the affiliating university and IQAC committee of the college. The College has implemented several welfare measures to keep the morale and motivation of the employees high. College also provide maternity leave and paternity leave to teachers as per the Government regulations. Due to absence of Capacity Building program, IQAC has to focus on Capacity Building program for Non-Teaching Staff.

#### *Qualitative analysis of Criterion 7*

Safety and security of the girl students and faculty are taken care of. Counselling is required to the girl students by specialist Counsellors and Lady Faculty members. Common Room facility is offered to girls only. The College has made Rain Water harvesting System and also introduced Green Practices. Campus is a plastic free campus. The college is having an attractive green landscape with the trees and plants. **But there is absence of Green Audit.** 

The College is yet to provide complete facilities for differently abled person. The facility is not adequate at the moment. The Institution organizes national and regional festivals, Birth/Death anniversaries of great Indian and International personalities are organised besides celebrating the days 15th August and 26th January etc. The College maintains transparency in Financial, academic and administrative functions. The institution was established to meet aspiration of the people in the area and succeeded to translating its vision into reality.

As a part of best practices, the institution has various programmes to promote gender equity. Over the past 10 years, the girl student enrolment shows that gender equity is ensured in the system. Environmental consciousness is displayed by organizing annual environment day.



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Rain water harvesting units are in existence in the system. Students are provided awareness about the water conservation techniques and ground water recharge.

The college adopts two best practices on providing the financial aid to deserving students and introduced Mid – Day meals scheme for the poor students. The college is enrolling students from economically weaker section of the area. Students are provided nutritional support while enhancing retention and fostering first generation learners to acquire at least first degree.

## Future plan of action Criterion 1 - Curricular Aspects

• CURRICULUM PLANNING AND DELIVERY. In order to retain this strength, the academic planner has to be continuously evolved for every semester and work diary of teachers must be preserved where the HOD has to certify the coverage of topics as per academic planner. This documentation must be preserved carefully. Backlogs in portions coverage must be documented in the work diary of individual teachers and a consolidated record for which a standardized format is generated must be maintained by the HOD. Record for having completed the backlogs in syllabus along with the dates must be well documented along with the signatures of the teacher and the HOD.

IQAC should maintain a soft copy of all individuals record in a standardized format specific to the institution with date and timestamp in the document. Wherever there is a non - response from any specific department as per the defined timelines, IQAC should pull up the HOD and call for explanation.

- ACADEMIC CALENDAR. Every semester the academic calendar must be developed in accordance with the calendar of events of the university. Every department must have invited guest lectures of atleast 3 per annum spread over two semesters. Atleast eight departments must conduct workshops and conferences at the rate of one per annum. One National conference of any department must be planned. One cultural/sports/NSS/NCC National event every year must be conducted. One international conference in any subject/general topic for a period of five years must be planned. These should be documented in the calendar of events with appropriate budget provisions. As far as possible, events must be conducted as per the planned date without any postponement for whatever reasons be it. One communication skills and soft skills program per annum for non - teaching staff must be conducted for a duration of one week with atleast 2 hours per day towards the end of the day. Planning these should be the sole responsibility of IQAC and its implementation should also be the responsibility of IQAC.
- STAFF PARTICIPATION IN BOS/BOE/Add on courses curriculum design, etc. Every year the participation of the teachers in various events including the



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evaluation work at the university or other autonomous institutions must be collected for which a date must be set in the calendar of events for staff to submit the appointment letters, participation letters, minutes of the meeting, etc. This should be well documented by IQAC and a report must be generated about these activities.

INTEGRATION OF CROSSCUTTING ISSUES relevant to Professional Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum.

Many invited lectures, programmes by students, rallies in the neighborhood generating awareness about the environment, water harvesting, gender equality, gender sensitivity, environment audit by some agencies involving our students, IPR lecture workshops, etc. must be conducted and well documented. IQAC could monitor the events being organized, identifying resource persons, etc. Calendar of events must make provision for these during afternoon times. Student participation in these programmes must be enhanced by providing certain amount of autonomy to student volunteers.

- ADD ON / CERTIFICATE PROGRAMS. The existing programs in collaboration with The Times of India Group - Teach India, electronics add - on courses, computer science courses should continue to provide the programs currently running. Add – on courses in many subjects must be introduced. Add – on courses in Commerce and BBA should be floated. Identification and implementation of teaching agency and course should be Suo motto taken by IQAC particularly in respect of B.Com. and BBA. The objectives of the college are paramount than the choice of individuals in the system. Each department must be set a target to float add - on courses, atleast one per annum. A basket of add - on courses must be identified and allow students to choose any one in each semester. IQAC should be the vehicle for this. PG Chemistry and PG Commerce should also introduce add – on courses and research methodology workshops frequently.
- EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING, FIELD VISIT, INTERNSHIPS, etc. Regular program must be designed with periodic review meetings, scheduling of visits through a calendar of events for different departments, identifying companies / research institutions/ laboratories/etc. for internships. All courses must have this component in some or the other form. Brainstorming with each department is essential to arrive at the introduction of experiential learning. Practicals must also be treated as experiential learning with small exercises provided after each experiment is completed pertaining to the application part of it. Docuemnetation must be made about the experiential learning.
- CURRICULUM FEEDBACK. A well-defined format needs to be developed through brainstorming of a group of teachers. Every semester the feedback needs to be



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collected. IQAC should maintain a record of all the feedback samples issued with an analysis thereon. Different stakeholders must be involved in this mechanism.

• STUDENT FEEDBACK. Simplified feedback on every subject and every teacher must be taken atleast one in each semester. Analysis must be made, and report provided to each teacher along with a consolidated report to the management.

#### Criteria 2- Teaching- Learning and Evaluation

- ENROLMENT OF SC/ST/OBC. This is encouraging at present. One of the remedies to enhance the enrolment to science courses is to provide fee concessions to these categories of students in unaided combinations. As per Karnataka Education Act, 50% of seats should be filled through merit. Provide fee concessions to the seats until 50% is filled. This may enable the enhancement of admissions in B.Sc. and thus the retentivity of science and various subjects. Fees for B.Sc. Electronics must be made much more lower to enhance the admissions to electronics and retain this course. In general, IQAC should debate and suggest the management to lower the fee structure further.
- STUDENT ENROLMENT. Student enrolment shows a steady decline over past five years for actual reasons beyond our perception. Digital marketing for enhancing admissions must be taken up and try to fill as many seats as possible. In the light of NEP 2020, admissions to science courses are a big challenge. Wide publicity must be taken up. So that this kind of a scenario where the sanctioned strength is high, and enrolment is low is posing a big problem in grading of the college. IQAC should hold brainstorming amongst HODs of science exclusively and find out whether the sanctioned intake can be reduced. Caution must be exercised in arriving at the conclusions. Once the intake is reduced there are several hurdles to get back the existing strength. Please debate on this issue with care, concern, and caution.
- ASSESSMENT OF LEARNING LEVELS OF STUDENTS. Each department must come out with a blueprint for assessing the learning levels of students through different tests of 1 hour much before the actual start of the classes. Usually between the declaration of PU results and the start of I Sem classes there will be generally sufficient gap. During this gap, bridge courses must be conducted to students admitted. One of the strategies is to start such bridge courses ahead of time. This would spread a message in the society about the academic programs in place and admissions happen quickly as well as in large numbers. Particularly, B.Sc. Computer Science and BCA course should be started ahead of time and teach them the logic development through flowcharts, algorithms and problem-solving techniques. Unless such measures are put in place, admissions will not enhance and the gaps in students go unnoticed. These measures must be well




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documented. Additionally, excel and word may be taught to all the students admitted in the college so that admissions may be enhanced.

- ADVANCED & WEAK LEARNERS. Student profiling must be made and identify advanced and weak learners in each semester. Tracking the progress of each cross - section of learners is very essential. Each department must maintain the list along with student details, measures suggested, monitoring plan evolved, progress of the student. Remedial Coaching must be made more robust in the system.
- USE OF ICT TOOLS BY TEACHERS. Appropriate training must be provided to teachers to adapt to ICT tools being used in the classes. IQAC must have periodic programs for this. Some investment may be required from the management.
- EXAMINATION RESULT RELATED GRIEVANCES. A separate committee must be constituted to enable the student grievances to be resolved in respect of marks card issues, results, etc. Proper documentation for recording the grievance received and remedial measures for having resolved the issue must be well documented. After the resolution, feedback from the student must be received in a google form through online. These feedbacks must be preserved along with phone number and mail id of the student.
- STUDENT GRIEVANCE CELL: Must be functional. It should visit different classes at various points of time to gather the grievances and resolve them. Documentation is a must. Vice – Principal must be the convenor of this cell. Other members must be senior teachers. Totally four members would suffice.
- PROGRAMME AND COURSE OUTCOMES. This must be well generated since the university does not provide the actual outcomes in the syllabus. Every department and for every paper, the outcome must be generated through the debates.
- QUANTIFICATION OF POs AND COs. Quantification details of each course (paper) has to be made on the following parameters.
  - Attendance of the student in the class for the entire semester
  - > Assignment performance
  - > Test Performance
  - Seminar presentations
  - University examination performance
  - Aggregate marks obtained along with grade at the semester end examination.

Debate may be further held to arrive at some more quantifiable parameters.



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PASS PERCENTAGE OF STUDENTS. A very important factor for the institution.
 Enhancement of results in every subject has to be ensured. Quality of teaching – learning must improve.

#### Criteria 3- Research, Innovations and Extension

- RESEARCH PROJECTS. Teachers must be encouraged to apply for research projects funded by UGC, DST, DBT, CSIR, DAE, VGST, etc. Those teachers who get minor research projects should be given a teaching workload relaxation of 2 hours per week. Those teachers who get major research projects must be given a teaching workload relaxation of 4 hours per week. Additionally management may also fund for some research projects upto an extent of Rs. 1 Lakh per annum for upto 5 projects a year. This would enhance the research culture in the institution. Those who have collaborative research with outside agencies must be given relaxation of stay in the campus upto about 5 hours per week or arranging such a time table that they would be free on two days in the afternoons. Progress in research activities must be measured quantitatively in terms of the papers presented in the conferences on the topic of their research. At the end of the project, a paper must be published in a journal listed under UGC CARE list.
- RESEARCH PAPERS PUBLISHED. Incentives must be provided to teachers to publish research papers. For every research paper published in UGC CARE listed journal, an incentive of Rs.1000 per paper maybe provided. Almost all teachers must publish atleast two papers in a period of 5 years.
- BOOKS AUTHORED OR PUBLISHED. Books publication maybe encouraged in case of teachers publishing books with ISBN or ISSN numbers. Here also an incentive of Rs.500 maybe provided per book publication.
- INNOVATION ECOSYSTEM. IQAC should take active role in creating an innovative hub for the college with various activities under it. This is a challenge to be realized by putting it into practice. Many aspects need to be brainstormed and concluded.
- EXTENSION ACTIVITIES. All extension activities conducted at any point of time must be followed by a report, photographs of the event, feedback by the students and other beneficiaries, etc. in soft copy should be submitted to IQAC. Only after the approval from IQAC the finance bill must be settled. Maybe an advance of 60% maybe released before the event and the remaining 40% to be released only subject to IQAC's approval. The channel for approval of event, budget for the event, final bill processing henceforth should be the following:
  - Submit the event proposal to IQAC
  - > IQAC after being satisfied send it for further process to the Principal
  - Principal sends it to the management with budget outlay details to MC for its approval



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- After MC's approval, a copy must be provided to the IQAC with all details maintained in the accounts section
- Any advance to be released the request letter has to follow the same channel as above
- Final bill settlement has to follow the same channel as above
- NCC & NSS ACTIVITIES. NCC must be made more active than the present state. More students from degree should be encouraged to enroll for NCC. NCC should prepare a set of students to participate in AITSC, RD Parade at Delhi, etc. An annual NCC alumni meet must be conducted along with some activities for them. NCC alumni must be invited for national festivals and light refreshments must be hosted. Rejuvenating NCC must be the topmost priority in the system. Top management must be apprised of its role in nation building and institution building.


Regarding NSS activities, the first objective is to identify an active NSS officer. I would suggest Prof. Girish Babu of Commerce to be appointed as NSS officer and he be deputed for training for some time in the university. In case Prof. Girish Babu is unwilling to accept this responsibility, maybe the new recruits in Commerce maybe tried. Maybe some young lady teacher could also be put who is active in organizing events and interacting with students. Many events must be planned for every year under NSS. New programmes maybe planned through brainstorming in a session with students and teacher members.

Adopting a government primary school in the nearby villages may be of help to the institution. Fund collection and other aspects may be planned in association with the students. Student activities including sports in this adopted school, strengthening the teaching – learning process through workshops for teachers in the school, enhancing student enrolment drives in the school, enhancing simple infrastructure facilities with the help of local MLA and MP as well as MP of Bangalore South, etc. may be planned.

Detailed plan must be evolved for rejuvenating the NSS activities. Students are the backbone of this unit.

#### Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

• INFRASTRUCTURE. An infrastructure committee must be put in place which has to meet atleast once in three months. Requirements like lights for the classes, fans, switches broken, bench shortage, bench upkeep, etc. must be periodically reviewed and a report must be submitted to IQAC as well as the principal for its upkeep. Similarly, the toilet cleanliness and it hygiene must be ensured through plan for monitoring. Monitoring report must be well documented and a copy must reach IQAC. This would enhance the maintenance issues automatically on a periodic basis and the need for spending huge money at a later point does not arise.



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- INTEGRATED LIBRARY MANAGEMENT SYSTEM. This is quite weak at present. I am not sure as to how the library functioning may be improved given the cross section of teachers we have and the functionalities in the system.
- BOOKS EXPENDITURE. We are in such a system where HODs do not spend the money allotted for books purchase. Towards the end of the financial year, many text books are added and even the entire amount is not utilized. Brainstorming sessions may be held to arrive at how to utilize the books budget and what category of books must be purchased like text books and reference books. Percentages maybe defined for text book allocation and reference book allocation.
- IT INFRASTRUCTURE UPDATIONS. No proper documentation is maintained at present. Rather than the BSNL FTTH connectivity, please interact with ACT Fober network and get one to the college. It is not only fast, but good service is available. Please explore this. Earlier they did not have the connectivity here. They maybe willing to provide connectivity now. IT Infrastructure committee may be set up exclusively whose job is to recommend the updations to hardware and software.

### **Criterion 5- Student Support and Progression**

- CAPACITY BUILDING & SKILL ENHANCEMENT. Proper courses must be identified for both staff and students. These must be periodically conducted and well documented. VVA alumni support may also be sought. Some courses may be planned in consultation with them. This needs top priority and it should start in the next two months. IQAC must be vested with this responsibility.
- GUIDANCE FOR COMPETITIVE EXAMINATIONS & CAREER COUNSELLING. Periodic guest lectures may be conducted for different semesters regarding career counselling. Proper documentation must be maintained. Each department must be provided a format for recording the guidance provided to students regarding competitive examinations. The format may include the student name, staff name, date & time of guidance provided, nature of guidance provided including question papers to be referred, reference books to be used, reporting back about the assignments completed, teachers' remarks and monitoring as well as compliance report of the student, etc. This functionality should be exclusively taken care of and monitored by IQAC constantly through departmental meetings.
- STUDENT GRIEVANCE, ANTI SEXUAL HARASSMENT, ANTI RAGGING. Committees must be made pro active. Reports must be submitted every month to IQAC. IQAC must interact with all these committees on a monthly basis. Calendar of events may include the schedule of meetings with these committees. Grievance resolution must be the joint responsibility of the convenor of the committee, IQAC coordinator, Vice Principal, and the Principal.
- PLACEMENT CELL. Placements functionality needs to be outsourced. A suitable company may be identified and the recruitment process may be provided to them



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through an MOU. Caution must be exercised regarding the terms and conditions. MOU must be countersigned by the Secretary so that the MC is fully aware of the outsourcing and its fall out. One has to be extraordinarily cautious in identifying the placement company, otherwise the college may become news for wrong reasons in the media. Strengthening placements would enhance admissions in the college.

### Criterion 6- Governance, Leadership and Management

- VISION, MISSION. There is a need for revisioning the objectives of the institution. A professional organization may be invited to design new vision and mission of the college.
- PERSPECTIVE PLAN. Needs brainstorming and evolution of perspective plan.
- PBAS. This must be introduced for all teaching staff. For non teaching staff a similar approach is developed by MC which would be introduced shortly.
- IQAC. Must be more active than the present. Most of the activities in the system must be monitored by IQAC. Members of IQAC should necessarily be very senior teachers so that there is a hierarchy to be respected in the system. Student members must be induced to the team. About three/four meetings with the student members may be conducted per annum. About six meetings only with the IQAC staff must be conducted per annum. Core IQAC team including external members and management nominee must meet at least once in two months on a scheduled date. IQAC must take care of administering student feedback forms and its analysis such that atleast one per semester is collected and analysed. Participation in NIRF is a must. This must be taken up immediately. It is easy to participate if data is organized slightly differently from the existing NAAC data.

#### Criterion VII - Institutional Values and Best Practices

- WOMEN EMPOWERMENT COMMITTEE. An exclusive budget allocation must be communicated at the start of the year. Programs like gender sensitization, women health related issues, domestic violence prevention measures on women, role of Women Commission, schemes available for single girl child, girl child protection rights, role of Internal Complaints Committee at college level, taluk level, district level, etc. programs.
- ALTERNATE SOURCES OF ENERGY. Given the present financial condition of the management the alternate sources of energy cannot be imagined to be installed in the college. It is required to explore CSR(Corporate Social Repsonsibility) funding for solar electrical energy. It needs persistent efforts of a dedicated team to be set up. It is possible if some proper identifications are made.
- WASTE MANAGEMENT. BBMP has several waste management organizations. We had consulted one solid and wet waste management organization, named SAHAY...

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working under BBMP. It did not materialize. Some such organization may be collaborated for better waste management.

- RAIN WATER HARVESTING & WATER CONSERVATION. Sufficient programs must be organized to create awareness amongst the staff and students. Rain water harvesting units in our college are not functional. It needs to be rejuvenated.
- ENVIRONMENT CONSCIOUSNESS. Many programs must be conducted under this like no vehicle day, plastic free zone, environment audit of the campus and the neighborhood, etc.
- BEST PRACTICES. Other than the existing best practices showcased, efforts must be put to identify new best practices. Unless new practices are identified, system cannot progress well.
- INSTITUTIONAL DISTINCTIVENESS. We have tried portray academic excellence as the institutional distinctiveness. Efforts must be put, brainstorming conducted to identify new distinctiveness for the institution. Institution should try to establish collaboration with foreign universities and provide dual degrees which may become one of the distinguishing features ahead.

- Instead of letting students choose the project's product, it is worth letting students choose the project's purpose
- Instead of starting class with a standard and target it would be better to start the class with a story

#### **Plan** – 1. A teacher to handle at least two hours per week for a class

- 2. To interact with students to understand their basic skills and to impart the same if they lack.
- 2. Academic planner to be given to students in the beginning of the semester
- 3. To make the students comfortable by reviewing the relevant topics required for the course.



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- 4. To encourage the students to speak and you listen and interject and facilitate conversation when needed, and then thank the students for their participation. This should be the norm throughout the course in every class.
- 5. Speak about the course outcome, program outcome and program specific outcome so that student get to know the purpose of the course.
- 6. To involve the students in learning, give them short assignments, conduct quiz, encourage them to give seminars, have group discussions, show videos relevant to the topic, connect the topic in every day usage and kindle interest in them.
- 7. To tack continuous learning outcome of each student
- 8. In each class **student's activities** can be given like..2minutes writing about the topic which teacher has just finished in the class. The teacher may understand the effectiveness of the teaching and the learning outcome
- 9. **An assignment** on Just a Minute Lecture, Cooperative learning, Content summary writing, Group quizzes can be given to improve the overall skill development of students.
- 10. Internship to Industry compulsory
- 11. Visit to other department (Science or Commerce) to learn about various activities of the subject and the department, to aware of department instruments and their usage
- 12, A Feedback (Online/Off line) by students after each class on the Content, Delivery of lecture, Linking to previous topic, Usage of ICT etc
- 13. Resources of learning objects can be created or shared by other departments
- 14. Put Questions and Interactive Elements in teaching content like PPT

#### 3. Evaluation and assessment reforms

- Assessments could be written mode exams, tests, open book tests, essay writing, objective tests, quizzes, class assignments, home assignments, reports, dissertations, case study etc...
- Assessments could be oral mode viva, group discussions, rapid fire questions, one question quiz etc...
- Assessments could be practical mode lab work. Computer simulations, cocurricular, craft work etc...
- Assessments could be integrated mode paper presentation, seminars, Field assignments, poster presentations, SWOC analysis, portfolios etc..
- Plan: 1. To adopt a common evaluation and assessment mechanism across all disciplines
- 2. Assessment to focus on core concepts, higher order and foundational skills
- 3. 70% of internal assessment score to be based on (a) assignment, (b) oral/written quiz
- (c) attendance in the class, (d) test to be conducted by respective teachers (e) presentations and (f) subject based viva-voce – to adopt any three these.
- 3. 30% of internal assessment to be based on Internal Tests (one at the college level



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4. Lab assessment based on regularity to lab, ability to perform experiments and analyse results and their interpretation

- 4. Final evaluation through University Examination
- **4. Mentorship** Parameters to be adopted to mentor every student so that he gets a conducive atmosphere for learning
- 1. To create a cordial atmosphere among the mentees so that they feel comfortable with the mentor.
- 2. To collect all possible information about the students to carry out the mentoring process.
- 3. To create a WhatsApp group for communication and meet the students as frequently as possible.
- 4. To Specify what the mentor will offer (e.g., facilitating creation of a personal development plan, listening, sharing helpful experiences and information, and offering constructive feedback)
- 5. To make them feel confident in the course they have chosen.
- 6. To inculcate discipline amongst students which is very essential for their growth.
- 7. To encourage students to think independently and take decisions and consult others whenever necessary.
- 8. To extract information from the students about their interests.
- 9. To initiate and conduct SWOC (Strengths, Weakness, Opportunities and Challenges) analysis by helping them in the process.
- 10. To monitor the regularity of students to classes and if found wanting, talk to them and solve the issue.
- 11. To encourage them to put forward all types of grievances including academic and otherwise by giving them confidence that you will maintain confidentiality.
- 12. To help them in time management in dealing with curricular and extracurricular activities.
- 13. To hold discussions with them on various issues and encourage them to actively participate to put forward their views.
- 14. To inculcate moral and ethical values in them.
- 15. To monitor their progress in class and monitor their internal assessment scores and if needed address their grievances with regard to it.
- 16. To encourage them to participate in extra-curricular activities and to attend the guest lectures conducted by departments.
- 17. To address issues with regard to payment of exam fees and college fees online.
- 18. To guide them about the opportunities available for higher studies or for jobs.
- 19. To create a feeling to students that there is someone in this institution who cares for them and wants them to perform and achieve big.
- 20. To encourage students to perform well in exams for their professional growth.
- 21. Active listening, availability and analysis by mentors
- 22. Trust the mentees and encourage the students to step out of their comfort zone



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**Plan:** 1. To allot 25 to 30 students to each mentor preferably the students of the class that the mentor takes

- 2. To record all details with regard to students progress and interactions with students
- 3. To interact with parents if necessary.
- 4. To share the information with others who handle these students
- 5. To prepare a report of each student and monitor his progress
- 6.Technology to track students' progress (Usage of Software app like Teacher Cloud Progress Tracker/My students Progress etc)

#### 5. Parameters for formative and summative assessment

**NEP** - Focus on regular formative assessment for learning rather than the summative assessment that encourages today's 'coaching culture'

**Formative assessment** occurs throughout a class or course, and seeks to improve student achievement of learning objectives through approaches that can support specific student needs through In-class discussions, group work, weekly quizzes, simple writing assignments in class, home assignments, surveys etc..

**summative assessments** evaluate student learning, knowledge, proficiency, or success at the conclusion of an instructional period, like a unit, course, or program through teacher created exams, standardised tests, final - projects, essays, presentations, reports, final grades etc..

### 6. Hosting FDP

**Plan:** 1. To conduct at least one faculty development program by each department or a joint programs by two to three departments for durations of one week and above each year either online or offline.

2. Every teacher to attend at least one FDP for every two years conducted by academic staff college/universities/research institutes/UGC etc..

#### 7. Technology integration

**NEP** - Extensive use of technology in teaching and learning

- **Plan:** 1. Technology integration is the use of technology resources -- computers, mobile devices like smartphones and tablets, digital cameras, social media platforms and networks, software applications, the Internet, etc. -- in daily classroom practices
- 2. To compulsorily integrate technology in our teaching methods like using PPT Presentations, video lectures etc...
- 3. Types of technology usage can be 1. Online Learning and Blended Classrooms

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- 4. To adopt Project-Based Activities Incorporating Technology, Game-Based Learning and Assessment, Instructional Tools like Interactive Whiteboards and Student Response Systems etc..
- 5. To conduct Web-Based Projects, Explorations, and Research, and Student-Created Media like Podcasts, Videos, or Slideshows

When effectively integrated into the curriculum, technology tools can extend learning in powerful ways. These tools can provide students and teachers with

- Access to up-to-date, primary source material
- ➤ Methods of collecting/recording data
- Ways to collaborate with students, teachers, and experts around the world
- > Opportunities for expressing understanding via multimedia
- Learning that is relevant and assessment that is authentic
- > Training for publishing and presenting their new knowledge

#### 8. Conduct of Remedial classes

**Plan:** 1. To allot at least two hours for each class for remedial coaching

- 2.To conduct structured remedial classes by providing the details to students in advance about the program
- 3. The program to include problem solving classes, to teach them to answer questions by providing distribution of marks allotted for each question, providing FAQs, time management etc...
- 4. To concentrate more on weak learners and if necessary to take extra classes

#### 9. Programs for advanced learners

**Plan:** 1. To provide them with extra information through reference books, important websites etc..

- 2. To create awareness about competitive exams and a structured guidance to crack these exams
- 3. To provide them with model question papers of competitive exams like JAM, NET etc.. and discuss the answers.
- 4. To take classes on Saturdays and Sundays to support students to crack these exams
- 5. To encourage the students for extensive research in Premier Institution.
- 6. To provide information on Scholarship program offered by various overseas Institution for higher studies
- 7. To motivate to set career goals and target like getting patent etc in future

#### 10. Creation of scholastic atmosphere



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As a teacher, you need to establish general rules of conduct for your classroom. Inculcate the following in students

- 1. Treat others as you would like to be treated.
- 2 Respect other people and their property (e.g., no hitting, no stealing).
- 1. Laugh with anyone, but laugh at no one.
- 2. Be responsible for your own learning.
- 3. Come to class and hand in assignments on time.
- 4. Do not disturb people who are working.
- 5. Establishing worthwhile work habits, persistence, independence, time management and an appreciation of the value of learning
- Learning is structured to empower the students to share their thoughts and ideas.
- Learning takes place through group discussions, projects as well as hands-on activities and experimentation.
- Emphasis is laid more on 'learning by doing' rather than rote-learning. Our teachers act as facilitators and guides throughout the learning process.
- To introduce **Yoga and Meditation** once in a week for each class through a qualified teacher

#### 11. Measures for research intensive programs

- > Students conducting and presenting original research or creative work.
- > Students learn to ask appropriate research questions or identify appropriate creative objectives,
- > Students select and implement appropriate methods, analyze and interpret results responsibly, and disseminate the work effectively, as appropriate for the particular discipline and level of the course.
- > In First Year every student or a group of students should write A Review Paper. In second year based on the same Review topic student can pursue research. This will strengthen and motivate a student to enter into experiments and improve skill and improvise in experiments in better way.
- Visiting Research Institution or Industry for every semester is compulsory.
- > To Establish a Central Research Laboratory where students can get an opportunity to look at various sophisticated Instruments under one roof

**Plan:** 1. To increase the number of inhouse projects with the available resources,

- 2. To collaborate with research institutes/industries,
- 3. To sign MOUs with research institutes and industries
- 4. To encourage students to read research articles and write reports
- 5. To make students take up internships
- 6. To invite research scholars and scientists from research centres for guest lectures

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7. Visits to research laboratories, places of interest, Industrial visits to be permitted and subsidised - 2-3 departments may be clubbed together if the same students are involved.

#### 12. Measures for teaching intensive programs

Teaching programs must put emphasis on the development of cognitive skills (reading, learning, remembering, logical reasoning and paying attention) and learning outcomes

Plan: 1. To plan and execute academic planner in letter and spirit

- 2. to provide academic planner to students so that they are aware of what you will be teaching,
- 3. To adopt online classes for extra coaching outside the class hours
- 4. To prepare video lectures and share with students for revision
- 5. To prepare study material and upload to college website

### 13. Investment for the lab equipment for the next four years

To provide the necessary expenditure that could be incurred for lab equipment due to changed syllabus and introduction of four year program based on previous years expenditure.

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## **IQAC**

# Action taken report 2021-22

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has taken the suggestion made in the IQAC meetings held on the days 15th November 2021, 4th February 2022, 22nd April 2022, 26th May 2022 and 20th August 2022 as suggested by the IQAC team and the administrators and the recommended were implemented and appropriate action was taken.

- 1. The plan of action 2020-21 and the action taken report was put for ratification in the meeting held on 15th November 2021. For the academic year 2021-22, the plan of action 2021-22 was discussed in the same meeting...
- 2. Different committees of the college were reconstituted with minor changes.
- 3. The preparations for the 4th cycle of NAAC accreditation was in full swing and successfully competed with Peer team visit on 5th and 6th May 2022. The college was accredited with B++ grade with CGPA of 2.91.
- 4. The NAAC report i.e. grade point report was analysed and all the suggestions were discussed and are being implemented.
- 5. Add on courses were conducted successfully by the departments of Chemistry and biochemistry, Botany, Microbiology, Commerce and management, English, Biotechnology and Electronics.
- 6. The extension activities were held as per plane by all the four wings of the college namely, NSS, NCC, YRC and R&R.
- 7. Semester results for the academic year 2020-21 and the odd semester of 2021-22 was discussed in detail and departments were asked to take the necessary action.
- 8. Advanced learners and slow learners were identified and they were given respective guidance for improvement.
- 9. Several guest lectures and workshops were also held. An FDP program was held by department of Chemistry and biochemistry.
- 10. The proposals that were sent to BCU for new courses and increase in strength were approved and the courses will start from academic year. (Courses are B.Com - Business data analytics, MCom - Financial analysis and to increase in strength of BCA course by 40).

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
